### FIELD TRIPS

The field trips are designed to complement a particular lecture in the lecture series and are held in the week following that lecture. Tickets for field trips are available only to lecture-series ticket-holders. Registration is limited by capacity of busses and places to be visited. Each trip is offered on two dates—please indicate preferred date. The cost of luncheons, ranging from no charge to about \$2.00 each, is not included in the tour price. Such costs will be collected on the day of the trip. There are no refunds on field-trip tickets. Where possible, exchanges may be arranged with other subscribers at the lecture preceding each tour. A complete schedule and description of field trips will be mailed to all ticket-holders. In general, trip schedule is 8:45 A.M.—4:00 P.M.

- Sept. 23 (Tues.) or Sept. 24 (Wed.) • Visits to new Chicago buildings: the *Sun-Times* Building, Executive House, the Prudential Building, the Morton Salt Building, and the Inland Steel Building, with a short tour of older architectural landmarks of Chicago's changing skyline.
- Oct. 7 (Tues.) or Oct. 8 (Wed.) • Discussion of orientation problems of Puerto Ricans to the United States by the director of the Puerto Rican Labor Office. Visits to the Lawndale Area and the Chicago Commons neighborhoods, which have undergone ethnic and cultural changes, to see community problems and improvements.
- Oct. 21 (Tues.) or Oct. 22 (Wed.) • Tour of Central Police Building's Narcotics Bureau, "rogue's gallery," crime laboratory, central complaint room, and women's detention quarters—greeting by Commissioner O'Connor. Visit to County Jail—greeting by Sheriff Lohman—and to House of Correction.
- Nov. 5 (Wed.) or Nov. 6 (Thurs.) • After visit to Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Smith brokerage office, a tour of the First National Bank and the Federal Reserve Bank, with explanations of their operations and services.
- Nov. 18 (Tues.) or Nov. 19 (Wed.) • Tour with demonstrations at the Enrico Fermi Institute for Nuclear Studies on the University of Chicago Campus and visit to the Cook Technological Center in Morton Grove, vital in development of the Intermediate Range and Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles and space research.

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UNIVERSITY COLLEGE is the adult educational branch of the University of Chicago. Its Downtown Center, now located at 64 East Lake Street, makes available to the intelligent, concerned adult in the Chicago area the intellectual resources of the University. It offers credit courses in more than forty fields and special non-credit programs of liberal and professional education. Among the latter are the Basic Program of Liberal Education for Adults, the Fine Arts Program, the Public Lectures Program, the Center for Programs in the Mass Media, the Center for Programs in Government Administration, the Office of Special Services to Business and Industry, and a series of Special Courses, including seminars, workshops, and tours. All these programs are described in detail in the new 1958-59 Annual Prospectus catalogue, which is available on request from the Downtown Center, 64 East Lake Street, Financial 6-8300.

THE WOMAN'S COLLEGE BOARD of Chicago, established in 1933, is a non-profit organization serving twenty-eight liberal arts colleges and their local alumnae. It is a co-sponsor of the "Know Your Chicago" series, an associate member of the Chicago Educational Television Association, and a sponsor of radio programs by member colleges. Other services include free college counseling for high-school girls and publication of an Alumnae Club Guide and a Handbook of Information about member colleges. Admissions conferences are arranged with college representatives, and placement counseling is provided. The Third Educational Forum, "International Horizons for the Educated Woman," will be presented at the Palmer House on Monday, February 2, 1959.
