## 1987 Program of Tours

Please read carefully the instructions on how to order tickets. Check tour dates and departure times carefully. Each tour will be offered twice, once on a Tuesday and again on Wednesday. The price of each tour is \$20.00. Lunch (gratuity included) is provided on all tours. All tours depart from and return to North Western Railroad Station. Tours operate on closely coordinated schedules, and the departure of buses cannot be delayed for latecomers. Since program arrangements must be made many months in advance, scheduled events may sometimes be subject to change. Comfortable shoes are recommended for all tours. Smoking is not permitted on the buses. Tour chairmen or their representatives may require subscribers whose physical limitations will expose them to danger or will delay the progress of a tour to return to the buses or to withdraw from the tour.

Tour One Tuesday, September 15 ● Wednesday, September 16

Film in Chicago-Behind the Scenes

Depart from North Western Station at 8:45 A.M. This tour

will highlight the film-making industry in Chicago, which brings many jobs and dollars into the city. Our first stop will be Chicago Access Corporation, where individuals and nonprofit groups learn to create and produce cultural, educational, and social service films and advertisements to be shown on public cable television. The visit will feature a tour of the production studios and presentations by a producer, a casting director, a location manager, a jingle writer, and other film industry professionals who will talk about making feature films and commercials in Chicago. At RAH Producers Center, which provides production facilities for feature films and commercials, we will learn how we could become movie extras. Following lunch at Scoozi! we will visit different post-production companies to learn about the high-tech magic of editing film and videotape. Our next stop will be Facets Multimedia Incorporated, a nonprofit organization that screens art and foreign films, where we will hear from independent filmmaker Tom Palazzolo and will see some of his work. We will return to North Western Station by 4:00 P.M. Note: This will be a long day.

**Tour Two** Tuesday, September 29 ● Wednesday, September 30

#### Children under Stress

Depart from North Western Station at 8:45 A.M. This tour will focus on efforts to detect children at risk and on programs to help them. We will go first to Juvenile Court to hear from Chief Judge Arthur Hamilton, Public Guardian Patrick Murphy, and other court officials and to observe the court system in action. Next we will visit St. Joseph Carondelet Child Center, a Catholic agency that provides daycare and residential treatment and education for abused and neglected children. Lunch will be served at Ann Sather's restaurant. During lunch Leon Intrater, Director of the Neon Center, a drop-in center for homeless children, will discuss the problems of the thousands of young runaways in Chicago. Several of these young people will speak to us about their experiences. Our day will conclude at Children's Memorial Hospital, whose Child Protective Services team will discuss the detection of different forms of child abuse. We will return to North Western Station by 3:30 P.M.

Tour Three Tuesday, October 6 ● Wednesday, October 7

#### The Indochinese Experience in Chicago

Depart from North Western Station at 8:45 A.M. This tour will introduce subscribers to members of several Southeast Asian groups who are building new lives and strong, vital communities in Chicago. Our tour will begin at Truman College, where Richard Friedman, the former Director of the Indochinese Refugee Resettlement Center at Fort Indiantown Gap, Pennsylvania, and a sponsor of seven Southeast Asian families, will give us an overview of the Indochinese refugees' experience in Chicago. After presentations by Truman College staff members, we will visit English classes for newcomers and will see a videotape that teaches job interviewing skills. At our next stop, the Vietnamese Association of Illinois, Director Ngoan Le and other members will give personal accounts of how they established new lives in Chicago. After lunch at a neighborhood Southeast Asian restaurant, we will visit the Cambodian Association of Illinois, where we will hear from several Cambodian refugees and will see examples of crafts; the Vietnamese Buddhist Temple, where one of the monks and members of the congregation will explain Buddhist worship and the temple's important role in the community; and the Chinese Mutual Aid Association, an organization formed by ethnic Chinese from various Southeast Asian countries. After leaving the Chinese Mutual Aid Association we will take a walk down Argyle Street, which is lined with Asian shops. We will return to North Western Station by 3:30 P.M.

Tour Four Tuesday, October 13 ● Wednesday, October 14

#### Living with the Lake

Depart from North Western Station at 8:30 A.M. Note: For the convenience of North Shore subscribers, buses on this tour only will stop at 8:45 A.M. at the entrance to Jos. A. Bank Clothiers, 1101 Skokie Boulevard, in the Edens Plaza, Wilmette, to pick up participants. This tour will explore various strategies, all of them experimental and costly, to control erosion along the Lake Michigan shoreline. We will begin at Lake Forest City Hall, where we will learn about the \$8.5-million Forest Park Beach Shoreline Protection, Restoration and Recreation Development. We will then visit this model project to study its effectiveness. Our next stop will be the Illinois Beach State Park in Zion, whose

shoreline includes the only natural sand dunes in Illinois and whose diverse habitats support a rich variety of wildlife and birds. Here a major program of low-technology management is protecting the park and the lodge from rising lake and groundwater levels. Weather and lake conditions permitting, we will take a hayride tour of the park. We will also visit the park's North Point Marina, which, when completed, will contain the largest small-craft harbor on the Great Lakes and a resort complex. Lunch will be served at the park lodge. After viewing a film on the Des Plaines River Wetlands Demonstration Project, we will visit the project site in Wadsworth. Here scientists are turning cornfields into wetlands in a long-range effort to improve water quality, to control floods, and to create wildlife habitats. After dropping North Shore subscribers at Edens Plaza, we will return to North Western Station by 4:30 P.M. Note: This will be a long day. The tour is largely outdoors, involves a great deal of walking, and is likely to be muddy and wet at times. Dress accordingly.

Tour Five Tuesday, October 27 ● Wednesday, October 28

#### **Beyond Impressionism**

Depart from North Western Station at 8:45 A.M. This tour will offer a fresh look at a thought-provoking subject contemporary art. We will begin at the Museum of Contemporary Art, whose Director, Dr. I. Michael Danoff, will speak to us about the museum's mission. Our tour of the collections will point up the stylistic diversity that characterizes art in our century. We will then visit two remarkable private collections of modern art. For a perspective on the role of corporations in the contemporary art world, we will tour the collections of John Nuveen and Company, whose offices are located in a dramatic new building on Wacker Drive. At Lill Street Gallery we will view jewelry and works in glass and clay by the young artists who share this showroom space. The day will also feature a visit to the studios of the award-winning sculptor Richard Hunt, who will show and discuss several works in progress. Lunch will be served at the landmark Como Inn. We will return to North Western Station by 3:30 P.M. Note: Be prepared for a great deal of walking.

Tour Six Tuesday, November 10 ● Wednesday, November 11

#### In Service in Chicago

Depart from North Western Station at 8:45 A.M. This tour will go beyond the Christmas concerts on street corners and tagging on Doughnut Day to acquaint subscribers with the Salvation Army's vibrant, 102-year tradition of service to Chicago. To gain insight into the education that prepares recruits to work in the city and throughout the world, we will visit the Officers' Training Center. There we will tour dormitories, classrooms, and the chapel and will have the chance to speak with some of the cadets and officers. We will also see beautiful Booth Manor, which houses offices, a library, and a fascinating museum. To learn about the scope of the Salvation Army's accomplishments in improving the lives of Chicagoans, we will visit the Emergency Lodge, a haven for homeless families that offers shelter, food, medical aid, classes for children, and assistance in finding new homes; the Tom Seay Center, which provides food for hundreds of people each day and which sponsors a special senior citizens' program; and the Harbor Light Freedom Center, a residential treatment facility for male alcoholics that also provides housing and counseling for recently released prisoners. Lunch will be served in the dining room of the Officers' Training Center. We will return to North Western Station by 3:30 P.M.

### How to Order Tickets

#### (ORDERS MUST BE RECEIVED BY U.S. MAIL)

Tickets may be ordered in the form of:

(1) a "Maxi" Series, comprising the symposium and four tours;

(2) a "Mini" Series, comprising the symposium alone or the symposium and up to three tours.

Preference will be given to orders for "Maxi" Series and to "Mini" Series orders for the symposium alone. "Mini" Series orders for the symposium plus tours will be processed after August 26 in the order drawn to the extent that tickets remain available.

It is important for all subscribers to indicate whether tickets for the alternate day of the week or for other tours are acceptable, in the event that the tickets they prefer are sold out. When ordering tickets, subscribers may not request more than two sets of tickets in any one order envelope. Subscribers who disregard this notice will have their ticket orders returned unfilled.

The color-coded tickets are valid only on the dates for which they are issued and must be presented at the symposium and the tour buses. There are no refunds on symposium or tour tickets, and no replacement of lost tickets can

#### PLEASE NOTE SEVERAL SPECIAL FEATURES IN THE 1987 PROGRAM!

- This year's program again includes a sixth tour to accommodate more subscribers. As before, a "Maxi" Series consists
  of tickets for the symposium and four tours.
- Please note tour dates carefully, as they do not necessarily follow an alternate week schedule.
- A draw date system will again be used to insure an equitable distribution of subscriptions. All envelopes postmarked on or before August 12, 1987 will be placed in a container, and subscriptions will be drawn at random to determine the order in which they are to be filled. "Maxi" Series subscriptions and "Mini" Series orders for the symposium only will be processed as they are drawn. "Mini" Series orders for the symposium plus tours will be processed after August 26. No telephone inquiries about ticket orders will be accepted before September 2.
