

Why was Chicago recently named the most philanthropic city in the United States? What makes our city unique in the not-for-profit world? For answers, we will examine three exciting Chicago philanthropic success stories. All three are direct-service agencies with distinct missions, very different populations, and unique, innovative approaches to funding.

- Travel to the Gary Comer Youth Center to explore its John Ronandesigned green building. Hear the inspirational story of one man who funded programs to improve the lives of the youngsters now living in his old neighborhood.
- Visit the Chinese American Service League to see the many programs
  offered by this Chinatown agency. Learn about the capital campaign to
  erect an extraordinary new titanium-sided building designed by Kam L.
  Liu, as well as the ongoing search for operating funds.
- Tour the Center on Halsted, which serves Chicago's lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) communities. View the new green building designed by the Gensler architectural firm to provide space for the Center's programs and for a Whole Foods store. Understand how this creative partnership helps insure the current and future financial stability of the agency.

During the day, experts in the field of public policy will discuss the impact of government funding, regulations, and legislation on Chicago non-profit agencies.

"Vote early and often." We have all heard that comment about Chicago elections. Here is your chance to discover the truth with a privileged, in-depth look at our city's election process. On this tour, we will:

- Visit the Board of Elections headquarters to hear how election results are compiled, verified, and tabulated. Learn about early and absentee voting, challenges to campaign petitions, and judicial training. Take a mini-course in how to be an election judge.
- Go behind-the-scenes to see the new state-of-the-art voting machines purchased in preparation for the November election. Hear how they are regulated, maintained, and protected. Find out how the voting process works, including how ballots are prepared and securely entered into the system.
- Enjoy a lively lunchtime discussion with well-known academics, political pundits, media experts, and journalists. This knowledgeable group will address such topics as the power of persuasion and the many roles played by the media in determining candidacies, slates, and elections. Panelists will include Richard A. Devine, Loleta Didrickson, Bruce Dold, Christian Farr, Paul Green, Mark Hansen, Rick Kogan, and Carol Marin (the panelists will not be the same both days).

As our metropolitan area gears up to celebrate the 2009 Centennial of Burnham and Bennett's groundbreaking Plan of Chicago, a monumental effort is underway to develop visionary initiatives that will shape our world-class city's quality of life in the 21st century. Join us to hear how these proposals will address important issues such as transportation, housing, the environment and civic engagement. Tour highlights include:

- A guided bus tour of the Congress Parkway. Hear from The Friends of Downtown how their proposed new concept reflects Burnham's original vision.
- A lively, thought-provoking presentation during which you will learn and
  contribute through exciting visual presentations and interactive planning
  exercises. Hear from dignitaries representing Chicago Metropolis 2020,
  The Burnham Plan Centennial, Roosevelt Square, the Chicago Housing
  Authority's Plan for Transformation, Chicago 2016 (Olympics), The Trust
  for Public Land (Bloomingdale Trail), National Public Housing Museum,
  and CMAP (Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning).
- A developer's bus tour of the historic Roosevelt Square district and a presentation of plans to revitalize and redevelop this exciting mixed-income neighborhood.
- A tantalizing preview of the 150-story Chicago Spire by Santiago Calatrava.
   At the developer's headquarters overlooking the lakefront construction site we will tour luxurious model apartments and see videos describing the architectural design and engineering innovations of this immense project.

### CSI: Chicago

Crime solving 101: find evidence, catch criminals and send them to jail—all in 60 minutes. Such is the CSI fiction depicted on television. Discover the real story of crime scene investigation with this rare look at forensic science in action. Journey behind-the-scenes to see how evidence is gathered, processed and utilized in identifying both victims and criminals. This tour offers the rare opportunity to:

- Visit Chicago's FBI headquarters and learn how the Evidence Response Team gathers evidence from cases ranging from missing persons to international terrorism.
- Hear law enforcement personnel from the FBI's Regional Computer Forensic Lab detail how they unlock incriminating data hidden on computers, cell phones, PDAs—even wristwatches.
- Tour the McCrone Research Institute where scientists from around the world learn the most advanced microscopy techniques used in examining physical trace evidence.
- Learn how medical examiners, lab experts, and attorneys collaborate to ensure evidence in criminal cases is obtained, analyzed and presented in the most compelling way.

Please note that the FBI has graciously agreed to participate in the tour as a public service. Security restrictions apply: you must be a U.S. citizen and present a valid government-issued photo ID to participate in this tour. If you wear a pacemaker, you must bring your pacemaker patient ID card. The form on the reverse side of the ticket order must be completed for FBI screening. Purses and cell phones must be left on the bus. Buses will leave at 8:45 am and return to Clinton Street later than usual at 4:00 pm.

### Everything Old Is New Again

#### Tour Five

Cutting-edge fashion, futuristic design, innovative theater, culinary excellence, all in a landmark setting? This is adaptive reuse—creatively modifying a historic building to serve a new tenant's vision. Our insiders' tour will take you to three superb examples of architectural adaptive reuse:

- The Carson, Pirie, Scott and Company building designed by Louis Sullivan, with its elegant columns and magnificent ironwork, and now home to the Design Center of the School of the Art Institute. See the incredible workspace where students are producing some of the most forward-thinking architectural design and fashion for tomorrow's world. Enjoy a brief preview of their spring fashion show.
- The historic Leiter building, designed by William Le Baron Jenney (called the "father of the skyscraper"). See how the architectural qualities that served its most famous tenant, Sears, Roebuck & Co., have been modified to become the near-perfect site of the thriving Robert Morris College. Visit some of RMC's program areas including the exciting student center to understand how the architect and designer converted a retail space into a beautifully workable academic setting.
- The landmark Water Tower Pumping Station, in operation since before the Chicago Fire. Hear from the architects who discovered a secret door that led to the creation of the innovative Lookingglass Theatre. End the day with a "taste" of a Lookingglass production.

SPECIAL FEATURES OF THE 2008 PROGRAM: Most tours end at 3:15 pm. However, Tour Two ends at 2:20 pm and Tour Four begins at 8:45 am and ends at 4:00 pm. Tour Four has special security requirements. If you wear a pacemaker, you must bring your pacemaker patient ID card.

SYMPOSIUM TRANSPORTATION: Participants are urged to take the buses provided. Valet parking is limited. If you must drive, please try to carpool and arrive no later than 9:00 am. If you plan to take the bus, reserve a space on the order form and your name will be placed on the bus list. There is no separate bus ticket.

TOUR TRANSPORTATION: Participants will board downtown buses on the west side of Clinton Street, immediately south of Madison Street, diagonally across from the Ogilvie Transportation Center. All tour participants are required to meet the bus in the morning and remain with the bus throughout the day. No special pick-ups or drop-offs are possible. At the end of the tour participants are free to leave the tour on their own rather than returning to the Clinton drop-off. Every effort will be made to get participants back at the announced time, although there may be unforeseeable delays. There is no separate ticket for the bus; your tour ticket will double as your bus ticket. Tours operate on tight schedules, and bus departure cannot be delayed. Scheduled events are subject to change. Smoking and the use of cell phones are not permitted on the buses.

DISABILITIES AND RESTRICTIONS: Tours may involve a considerable amount of walking, standing, and/or stairs. Please consult the descriptions for each tour or call the office if you are concerned. Comfortable shoes are recommended. Participants whose physical limitations will expose them to danger or will delay the progress of a tour may be asked to return to the bus or to withdraw from the tour. Know Your Chicago considers participants without regard to race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, age, national or ethnic origin, or other factors irrelevant to participation. #### HOW TO ORDER TICKETS

Mail Order Forms: Tickets are filled by lottery to ensure an equitable distribution of tickets to new and to continuing participants. Registration is not possible online or by fax. Participants may use the forms provided in this brochure, photocopy forms, or download forms from the website: http://grahamschool.uchicago.edu/ knowyourchicago. Ticket orders postmarked by the lottery deadline of August 8 and received by August 11 will be filled first. Any remaining tickets will continue to be sold after September 2 and throughout the tour season. Please mark the forms carefully since tickets are nonrefundable. If you have not received a ticket confirmation letter by September 2, or if you have questions, please call the Know Your Chicago program coordinator at 773/702-1727. Please note: if you order Tour Four you must fill out and sign the Required Security Information form on the reverse side of the icket order.

Symposium Tickets: The symposium provides an informative and broad perspective on each of the season's tour topics. Individuals may purchase symposium tickets without tour tickets. Participation in the lottery requires the purchase of a symposium ticket. If you cannot attend the symposium, you may sell the ticket or give it away, but must notify the office of the substitute's name and address before the event. If you do not purchase a symposium ticket, your order will be filled on a first-come, first-served basis after lottery ticketing.

Coming with Another Person.<sup>9</sup> A separate and complete order form must be filled out for each participant. If two or more participants

wish to attend one or more tours together, their orders must be mailed together in the same envelope with the desired tours listed in the same order of preference (some individuals may have more tour requests, but the order of preference should be the same). One person may pay for multiple orders.

PAYMENT: Tickets must be paid for by credit card. Ticket orders with checks will be returned unfilled. If you wish to pay for someone else's ticket(s), put your name and credit card information at the bottom of the form and put the other person's name at the top. You will only be charged for the tickets you receive. The charge will appear on your credit card statement with the following caption: "UChicago Graham School."

TICKET EXCHANGES AND WAIT LISTS: While there are no refunds on ticket orders, the office maintains a list of persons seeking to exchange tickets, but does not handle financial transactions between persons. All ticket exchanges must be reported to the office so that an accurate and current list of tour participants is available for security reasons. The office maintains wait lists for all sold-out tours. After lottery ticket distribution, participants may e-mail or phone the office to be on the wait lists.

Please note: If you purchase a Tour Four CSI: Chicago ticket and cannot use it, Know Your Chicago will try to find a substitute from the lottery wait list of those who have been cleared in advance by the FBI. No other substitutions will be possible.
